Those filing will need to either pay a \$5 fee or submit a petition with the required amount of signatures. If the candidate is thinking of submitting a petition, he or Those members whose term are she should check with the county clerk to find out the number of signatures needed as there are different numbers for each city and school board.

> It should be noted, that after a candidate has filed for an office, he cannot withdraw his name after the last date provided by law for filing for such candidacy.
