Local organization applies for grant

The Cheyenne County Caring Outreach "Lifeline" group is applying for a grant to purchase equipment. Glenn Glasco, Bird City, said that the local Lifeline group was recently notified that some of the Lifeline units were outdated and would need to be replaced but there were no funds for the replacements.

Lifeline is a small device that older people wear, either around their neck, on their wrist or clipped to their clothing. With this device, people are able to live in their homes much longer because if they have any problems, all they need to do is press the device, which is connected to the person's phone line, and trained personnel will receive the help call. This trained person will try to make voice contact with the person wearing the Lifeline unit and if that fails, they contact one of the "responders," who is generally a neighbor or family member living nearby.

By wearing a Lifeline unit, famly members feel more secure that their loved one will be helped immediately if needed. However, if tions and contributions.

the units are not updated, there will be fewer units for members of the county. At the present time, the county has 34 units which rent for \$30 a month. Of that amount, the Lifeline Systems responders charge \$14.40, leaving only \$15.60 for the group to operate on and certainly no extra money to replace or update units which cost \$700 to \$800 each.

Donations are certainly accepted but few people know the situation that the Lifeline group is in.

The county's Lifeline, a nonprofit organization, was started in 1987 by Mr. Glasco, Pastor Dan Waters, Bird City Methodist Minister; and Jim Harrelson, St. Francis Methodist Minister. At that time, there was the United Methodist Ministry Fund in Hutchinson and the group was going to apply but then both pastors moved so the idea was dropped for a while.

However, in 1988, the group made the definite move to apply and they received a 50-50 matching grant with \$9,500 being received but the group had to raise the other \$9.500 which they did from dona-
