

The county attorney talked about prairie dogs when the Cheyenne County Commissioners met Fri-

Kevin Berens, county attorney, reported that he had talked to Chris Tymeson with the Kansas Wildlife and Park's general council and one of the people who drafted the bill being presented to the Kansas House of Representatives. Attorney Berens said that basically the bill allowed farmers and ranchers wanting to raise prairie dogs the right to do so as long as they presented a control plan to the county commissioners and it was approved. It doesn't take away the rights of the farmer to control prairie dogs on their land.

On the bill, the word "eradicate" had been scratched and replaced with manage and control.


