out the steers. The buffalo cows will be bred back in August.

Those steers fed out will be sold for the meat. Buffalo meat is supposed to be more healthy than beef because it is leaner and has less cholesterol. However, buffalo eat the same feed as cattle but can survive on a lot less food. When it is dry, they will eat weeds and grasses that cattle will not eat.

Kip said the buffalo are considered 10 percent labor and 90 percent management which requires some grassland and minimal care. Before, when they raised the buffalo, they were able to contain them with electric fences and expect to do the same this time. The Rethkes have about 300 acres of pasture and wheat stubble for the buffalo and some will be kept in

Patsy said the buffalo are fun to watch and are actually playful about sundown. In Colorado, people would often park at the edge of the road to watch the buffalo.

Buffalo, if thy don't know the person, can be dangerous.... Some can be made into pets and some are even rode. They are also used in rodeo in trick riding.
