• Do you think winter is for the birds? Great because they could use your help! Food and water is scarce for them this time of year are some treats you can make:

-Hang suet in a mesh onion or potato bag on a tree.

-Coat a pinecone with peanut butter and roll in bird seed (most in most areas of the country. Here birds love black oil sunflower seeds).

-Spread a bagel half with honey, pull a cord through the middle and hang.

-Thread dental floss with cereal; this is great to drape on evergreen trees so the birds have a place to perch.
