

Station reopens doors after setting idle for 1 1/2 years

Troy James has reopened the doors of his full-service gas station in Bird City. It is exciting to see any new business sprout up in this area. But the story of the Philling Station is a bit more than that of just a busi-

The Philling Station closed after a tragic automobile wreck in September of 2001. The vehicle Mr. James, and his friend Dustin Wright, were traveling in collided with another vehicle driven by a lone individual. Mr. Wright and the other driver were killed and Mr. James was seriously injured.

It has been a long and painful journey for Mr. James since that accident but the goal of reopening his gas station has brought him to Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. this point. 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John Rollen Williamson 1943 - 2003

Col. John Rollen Williamson of Evans, Georgia died on Friday, June 27 while on vacation in the Yukon Territory, Canada. Family members include his wife, Dr. Nancy (Burk) Williamson of Evans, Ga., son John "Rusty" Williamson of Atlanta, Ga., daughter Jennifer Peay of Atlanta, Ga., and daughter Jessica Williamson of Athens, Ga.

Funeral services were held on July 5 at 1:00 p.m. at the Most Holy Trinity Catholic Church at 720 Telfair St. in Augusta, Ga. The family received friends with a Rosary at 5:00 PM and visitation until 7:00 p.m., Friday, July 4 at the Poteet Funeral Home, 214 Davis Road, Augusta, Ga. Internment will be in the Arlington National Cemetery, Washington, D.C., on August 6 at 3:00 p.m.

He was born in Emporia and raised in Topeka, Kansas. Col. Williamson lived in the Augusta area for the past 28 years. Col. Williamson received his Army commission in 1969. After serving tours in Vietnam, Germany and Korea he was selected commander of the 67th Signal Battalion at Fort Gordon. Williamson was the assigned to the Joint Staff in the Pentagon, Washington, D.C., as a military satellite communications (SATCOM) action officer.

Col. Williamson returned to Fort Gordon as the Army TRADOC System Manager for Satellite Communications where he actively managed every aspect of 33 Army SATCOM programs from technical manual development to the fielding and testing of hardware and software. In 1991 his aggressive work and unrelenting efforts on restructuring the Milstar satellite program were instrumental in the successful deployment of five Milstar satellites, the last of which was launched in May 2003. These satellites are providing unparalleled, secure communications support to U.S. soldiers around the world today.

Col. Williamson created and guided the development of an Army SATCOM Architecture Book as an educational tool for Army users. Now in its ninth version, the book continues to be updated, produced and distributed to over 3,500 users worldwide. Col. Williamson retired from the Army in July 1997 but continued to actively work with the Army SATCOM program as the lead contractor with Lockheed-Martin, Augusta Branch.

Col. Williamson military awards and decorations include the Legion

of Merit, Bronze Star Medal, Air Medal, Meritorious Service Medal (4), Defense Meritorious Service Medal, Army Commendation Medal (7), Joint Staff Commendation Medal, Air Force Space Badge, Joint Chiefs of Staff Identification Badge and Silver Order of Mercury.

Col. Williamson received his Bachelor of Science degree from Washburn University and his Masters of Business Administration from Kansas University. He attended the United States Army's Command and General Staff College and the Air Force War College.

Col. Williamson was especially proud of his family and attaining 'grandfather" status, thanks to the birth of his grandson Steven. Col. Williamson was an active member of The Church of the Most Holy Trinity, Catholic Church. He was the Eucharistic Minister for the church and table leader for the RCIA. He was an avid golfer and enthusiastic outdoors man, always ready for the next adventure.
