
nam War, receiving numerous commendations.

Kenneth Voeller, St. Francis, served in the 1st Cavalary Division, having been drafted in August, 1942. He completed his basic training in Little Rock, Ark., where they learned the ways of jungle survival and eventually ended up in El Paso, Texas.

At that time, the Army still had some mules and horses but was changing over to a more mobile type of transportation. It was time to be shipped out but the U.S. found that Australia would not allow the animals to be shipped to their country so the mules were left in Texas and Voeller drove a truck.

A series of stops from Australia eventually led his division to Japan.

Mr. Voeller reported when he returned to the United States, the people in his division were asked it they wanted to join the reserves and not one volunteered. This was unusual as there were generally at least one join-

A year after returning to the states, his division was sent a booklet showing where they had gone, articles and pictures. Today, he values that book and reported that few people have such a book.
