

Lady Cougars compete in team tournament

The Lady Cougars knew both sides of competition during the three team tournament in Brewster on Tuesday, Oct. 23, as they won one match and lost the other.

In the first event they played Golden Plains, losing the first game 18-25, but coming back to win the next two, and the match, 25-17 and 17-15.

In game one, the player with the most points served was Cristi Antholz. Sara Moore had eight good hits with two being aces.

"Stats showed our passing game for the team in the first game was nothing to brag about," said Coach Tammi Carmichael.

In game two, Amanda Banister was the high point server. C. Antholz, Steph Hubbard and Hayley Young were all 100 percent from the service line. The team improved their passing from the first game to make this a more intense game.

"Young had a great hitting game along with Moore, ..with the hitting duo of Young and Moore we added Hubbard who together made quite a few defensive plays at the net blocking and tipping," said Coach Carmichael.

In the third and deciding game of the match, Banister had 12

good sets which enabled Moore to put down eight solid hits, two of which were aces. Young and C. Antholz also had a good game, doing a commendable job hitting. The team served 94 percent from the line and won their third victory against Golden Plains this year.

Their next opponent, Brewster, would not be as generous. The Lady Cougars fell in two games by scores of 20-25 and 23-25.

"This was a tough match to lose but don't think we don't learn something from our losses," said Coach Carmichael.

In the first game, the ladies continued to serve well at 95 percent. However the passing percentage was only at 80 which indicates room for improvement. Banister and Hubbard did a great job of setting the ball.

The second game was led by Young who had the most points for the team. She also had a great passing game with 14. Hitting at the net was C. Antholz, eight, Moore, seven, and Young with six.

"This was definitely an intense game, we need to address our weaknesses and believe in ourselves. The game of volleyball is a mental game, we need to be confident, maintain our focus and play well," said Coach Carmichael.

Screening to be held in Sainty
