Ervin Hilt, 76, and his wife, Linda, 65, were coming home from a family gathering in Burlington when Mr. Hilt, coming around the curve onto U.S. 36 about 30 miles west of St. Francis but still in Colorado, slid off the road.

The Colorado State Patrol report noted that the accident happened at 5:53 p.m. mountain standard time. Mr. Hilt, driving a 1990 Ford van, entered the curve, lost control, slid and went off the left side of the road. The van then moved into a broadside slide, struck a fence, then rolled one time, stopping on its right side. Mr. Hilt was ejected, landed just north of the vehicle and was pronounced dead at the scene.
