Postal inspectors work with a variety of businesses in the private sector to identify illegal scams and protect consumers who receive

But what can consumers do to protect themselves? Consumers should be skeptical of any offer that no easy way to wealth and the sounds "too good to be true." The following questions can help individuals to evaluate questionable artist.

- Do you have to pay to receive your "prize" of enter a sweepstakes?
- Do you have to give any per-
- sonal or financial information? · Are you a "guaranteed" winner,
- or told "no risk is involved?" · Are you pressured into respond-
- ing or investing right away? · Are you asked for advanced

payment or cash only? If the answer is "yes" to any of these questions, the consumer should be wary. Ask that all statements about

the product or service be provided in writing. Check all offers with consumer protection agencies located neatest to the company. "The public should be aware," said Postmaster Weeden. There is
