Surgeon making medical history

northwest Kansas is making medical history with a procedure that allows women with cervical cancer to be cured and still be able to reproduce.

Dr. Kenneth Hatch grew up near the Nebraska boarder, just south of Benkelman. The *McCook Daily Gazette* printed a story about Dr. Hatch in the March 26 issue. In the article it quoted the Arizona Daily *Star* as stating that Dr. Hatch had performed just under 300 of the surgical procedures, called trachelectomies, worldwide.

The article states that instead of the standard operation for early stage cervical cancer, which normally requires a complete hysterectomy, a trachelectomy takes out only the cervix and the lymph nodes. The upper part of the uterus is left intact in the body so a baby can be conceived and carried.

An Arizona surgeon with ties to far more difficult to perform than the complete hysterectomy, which is why so few surgeons attempt it.

> "It is surgically complicated, which is why it is not done everywhere," said Dr. Hatch.

> The Arizona Daily Star said Dr. Hatch has done 14 trachelectomies in Tucson, with three of those women going on to deliver babies. It goes on to say cervical cancer strikes about 12,400 American women per year. Of these approximately 5,000 do not survive.

> In the article Dr. Hatch is praised by a Tucson gynecologist as a "world class doctor and a top notch researcher."

> Dr. Hatch is the son of the late Virgil and Edna Hatch and the nephew of Fran and Joan Hatch of Bird City. His wife, Rhea, is the daughter of Royce and LaNeta Anderson of Benkelman.


