The Republican River Riparian Project quarterly meeting will be held on April 15, at the Gateway Conference Center, Oberlin, located on 1 Morgan Drive just off Us 36 and 83 intersection. The meeting will begin at 10 a.m. with registration. Linda Henderson from Kansas Alliance for Wetlands and Streams will be the main speaker. There will be a business meeting. lunch will be provided. Following lunch there will be a tour.

The Republican River Riparian Project is lead by local land owners and producers from the states of Colorado, Kansas, and Nebraska. This is a joint effort to address concerns along the Republican River and its tributaries. The drainage area is approximately 24,900 square miles, of which 7,700 square miles are in Colorado, 9,700 square miles in Nebraska, and 7,500 square miles in Kansas. Concerns include natural, economic, and social resources. There are four initial goals developed by local representatives in the tri-state area. They are:

- To develop a landowner part-
- To preserve and enhance quantity and quality of water in the Republican River Basin.
- To increase educational opportunity in regard to water in the Republican River Basin.
- To preserve and enhance the economic viability of the Republican River Basin.

The project is currently in the planning stages and needs additional input from local landowners, producers, municipalities, and counties in the tri-state area. Those that have interest in the Republican River Basin should plan to attend
