"In the spirit of friendship and as a way of honoring the memories of our children, our chapter will be holding a memorial walk on Aug. 1," said Barb Van Allen.


Everyone who has lost a child is urged to join the walk and ask that others walk with them.

Department holds open house in celebration of new building

The McDonald Fire Department and the emergency medical technicians held an open house on Sunday, starting with a barbecue cooked by Tyrone Wilkins, and a potluck supper. This was followed by ice cream and cake, furnished by the McDonald Area Development organization.

The event was planned to show the public the new fire building and refinished older firehouse. This was provided by a Kan-Step Grant from the state and the people of McDonald provided the volunteer labor. Many people in the community

provided time, services and money to the project. Whether it was actual work on the building or cooking meals and snacks, the new firehouse was truly a community effort.

During the supper a video was played that showed the step-by-step process of the project.

Fire chief Bruce Nichols presented the three ambulances on duty. Two are regular ambulances and the older one of the three has been converted into a hazardous materials rescue unit. The firemen showed off their fire

trucks and described what they can do. One truck is designed for fighting fires in town and two others are fitted for rural service. A grant from the Federal Emer-


