
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Obituaries

She spent her growing-up years on the family farm north of Bird City. As a child, Helen Ruth attended grade school at the Brick School, and graduated from the Bird City Rural High School in 1941. She had one brother, Chester Kent, and one sister. Hollis Jean.

After graduating, Helen Ruth worked several jobs, including one as a telephone operator in Bird City. She later moved to Wichita where she worked for the Coleman Company. On a train trip home, she met a young man from Oklahoma named Roy Churchwell. They began corresponding, and were married June 16, 1945.

The couple spent their first several years in Bird City, where their first son, Stewart Thomas was born. But times were hard, and Roy and Helen Ruth moved to North Bend, Ore., where Roy got a job working in the sawmills. There, their second son, Roger Roy, was born in 1952, followed by his little brother, Eric Jon in 1960.

In 1963, Helen Ruth's husband Roy began working in construction and moved his family on the first of what would be many such moves over the next 10 years. This was an exciting time for the family, filled with new friends and experiences. But Bird City was still "home" and Helen Ruth would return there to her parents' farm during the summers bringing her young boys along with her.

After Roy's death in 1973, Helen Ruth returned for good to Bird City, along with her youngest son, Eric. She love cooking, and found a job as cook for the Cheylin schools. Later, she worked in the same capacity at the Good Samaritan Village in St. Francis.

Helen Ruth loved people and spent many happy hours with her friends and neighbors. But perhaps her greatest joy was her five grandchildren. She was delighted when her grandson, Chad, came to live with her in 1991. And after her next three grandchildren were born, she greatly enjoyed helping care for

County firemen received relief fun money from Insurance fund

sioner, Sandy Praeger has announced that Cheyenne County Firemen will be receiving a total of \$19,067 out of the Firefighters Relief Fund.

In 2003, Kansas firefighters responded to 158,000 calls. Unfortunately, one firefighter was killed in the line of duty and 236 firefighters had injuries. Every year, the Kansas Insurance Department administers the benefits for the Kansas Firefighters Relief Fund. This account is used to assist firefighters and their families when accidents or death occur in the line of duty.

This year, the fund has generated

tions statewide.

"I know that all Kansans sincerely appreciate the sacrifices these 12,500 volunteers and 2,800 career firefighters make everyday to protect everyone who lives in this great state," said Commissioner Praeger.

The Kansas Firefighters Relief Fund is generated by a 2 percent tax on the fire and lightning insurance premiums paid in the state for the previous calendar year. This year's distribution represents an increase of \$900,000 from last year's fig-

Last year, the Firefighters relief \$8.3 million that will be distributed Association provided \$1.36 million

The Kansas Insurance Commistor 582 Firefighter Relief Association for relief benefits to firefighters and \$555,000 in benefits to beneficiaries. The Firefighters Relief Assounteers and \$75,000 for pensions.

The majority of the funds are distributed to the 582 Firefighters Relief Associations throughout the state and is based on a formula established by the legislature according to population and valuation of the area served by the fire departments. Of the overall distribution, \$8 million will be distributed to local associations.

Cheyenne County received \$19,067 with the Bird City Fire Department receiving \$4,899; the Cheyenne County Rural Fire Department, \$6,809; and the St. Francis Fire Department, \$7,367.

In the surrounding counties, Rawlins County received \$15,674 and Sherman County received \$27,246.
