

Hunting season begins Saturday

The opening of pheasant season begins one-half hour before sunset on Saturday and, as usual, many hunters from other areas of Kansas as well as other states will be arriving in Cheyenne County on Friday so they will be able to hit the fields early in the morning.

Pheasant numbers in northwest Kansas are up a little this year although those numbers haven't taken a huge leap.

Small Game Biologist Randy

Rogers, with the Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks, said there had been a modest improvement in bird numbers for this area.

Last year, he said, there was a significant gain in the pheasant population. Even with increase the last two years, though, the numbers aren't anywhere close to where they were before northwest Kansas entered a drought in 1999.

Mr. Rodgers said the problem has been that the ideal breeding season

hasn't been put together yet. This year and in 2003, the weather helped the population grow.

In 2003, Mr. Rodgers said there was an ideal spring which allowed for a good wheat crop which created good nesting conditions. The good nesting conditions or the amount of wheat stubble carried the birds through a dry, hot summer.

This year, the area stayed dry all winter and continued through the spring, resulting in a poor wheat crop.

Mr. Rodgers said in May and into early June, he was worried because the conditions were terrible, but then the area started to pick up some nice rains and temperatures were moderate through the summer. The lower temps saved the birds.

However, pheasant numbers in northwest Kansas are still lagging way behind what people were expecting. Mr. Rodgers said there had been some growth.

The quail population is up but Mr.

Rodgers said it isn't anything to get excited about because the area isn't noted for large numbers of quail.

Hunters need to remember that it is important to get permission from landowners, hunt safely and wear orange.

Hunting licenses

Hunters can purchase licenses at Majestic Service, the clerk's office at the courthouse and at K-Store in St. Francis.

Bag limit/method of take

Hunters need to remember that the daily bag limit is four cocks and pheasants in possession for transportation must retain intact a foot, plumage or some part that will determine the sex.

Pheasant hunters may use shotguns and muzzleloading shotguns no larger than 10 gauge with shot only as a method of take. Other methods of take include bow and arrow and falconry.

Rod Young, Wendy White, Wendy Richmeier, Gary Brubaker, Stacy Hazuka, emergency medical technicians, and Larry Gabel, direc-

tor, were at the meeting. Commissioner Jane Brubaker said, since she had called Larry and Stacy to the meeting, she would start by asking Director Gabel why Mrs. Hazuka had been asked to turn in her radio?

At this point, the director asked for 15 minutes of executive session to discuss personnel. Commissioner Brubaker said it would be allowed but she wanted the director to understand she would ask the same ques-

tion after the executive session because she felt the public had a right to know what was going on. The commissioners, director and Mrs. Hazuka went into the private session.

When they opened up the meeting, it was announced that no decisions had been made. Chairman Tim Raile asked the director if he would like to make a statement.

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 of command had been broken and proper procedure had not been followed. Mrs. Hazuka's discipline followed these actions and she would be suspended from emergency medical technician duty for three months with the suspension ending at the end of January. Director Gabel said he had tried to address Mrs. Hazuka's safety concerns by researching the matter of adding dual tires to Ambulance 11A (Bird City's ambulance). He was waiting on an estimate to repair the ambulance as well as the cost of a new ambulance. Director Gabel said a new ambulance would cost between \$98,000 and \$102,000.
 He said the main reason he was suspending Mrs. Hazuka was a legality issue since she had let her concerns be known to the public, if she were to go on an ambulance run on 11A and something would happen, she or her family could sue him.
 Mrs. Hazuka was asked if she had any comments and she replied that she didn't.

Hazuka did not have a face-to-face meeting with him. Mr. Young said he felt everyone, whether a technician or not, should be able to talk to the commissioners with any concerns or problems they may have without the fear of a reprimand.

Commissioner Brubaker said she thought there had been no wrongdoing and that Mrs. Hazuka had followed proper procedure and chain of command.
 Mrs. Hazuka said she would still respond to a scene saying she would never leave a patient or put herself above the safety of a patient. She said she was a volunteer and the director did not hire her. Commissioner Ron Krien pointed out that Director Gabel was still her boss.

Mrs. Richmeier said she was surprised that Mrs. Hazuka had received a suspension and also surprised herself when she received a letter of reprimand from the director. When asked why she was reprimanded, she said it was for leaving the meeting early. She said it was a voluntary meeting and she had other things to do. Director Gabel later said that there were other matters but he refrained from commenting what the matters were.

Director Gabel said he didn't get into the emergency medical service to control people but, rather to help people and provide the best care to the county.

The bottom line was that Mrs. Hazuka could respond but not ride on Ambulance 11A and the commissioners and director will try to get a new ambulance as soon as possible and then look at getting another ambulance using grant funding.

In other business

• Director Gabel and the commissioners talked about receipts and reimbursements.

• Sheriff Eddie Dankenbring said that deputy Jeff Moser might be taking another job in law enforcement. Training reimbursement was discussed but no decision was made. He also talked about a letter he had received regarding Service Master's cleaning bill. The commissioners will pursue the proper legal channels.
