County supervisors/others attend 60th annual meeting

Over 500 county conservation district supervisors and others interested in natural resources conservation will gather in Wichita to attend the 60th annual convention of the Kansas Association of Conservation District.

Representing Cheyenne County will be Spencer and Lisa Schlepp, Herman Antholz, Roger Orth, Lynn Query, Randy and Rikki Rueb, Jeanne Dunn and Joan Gienger. Cheyenne County will be a host county for the convention.

The meeting will be held at the Airport Hilton Nov. 21 through Nov. 23 and will follow the theme of "Water for Kansans."

"Kansas Association of Conservation District is celebrating its 80th year," Don Rezac, president, Emmett, said, "and it is fitting we pay tribute to all the conservation work that has been accomplished."

"However, we must not rest on past accomplishments. There is an old saying, 'The future is what we make it,'" President Rezac said "Much soil and water conservation has been accomplished in Kansas, but there is much to do in the future to protect our water quality and

quantity." "We're looking forward to the 2005 program year and another banner year," he said.

"The conservation leaders will be busy throughout the three-day convention attending area meetings, committee meetings and break-out sessions. A lot of the time will be spent learning more about the Conservation Title of the 2002 Farm Bill and new issues on the horizon so district supervisors can represent their district well.

"Conservation districts are the catalyst that brings conservation and people together. It is our job to address all the natural resource conservation needs within our district, whether the need is for air quality, water quality and quantity, rangeland health, wildlife habitat improvement, or pesticide and nutrient management," he said.

Kansas Association of Conservation District is a grassroots organization that provides representation to districts at the state and national level.

Richard Jones, executive director of the organization from Salina provided the following as the high-

lights for the Monday and Tuesday activities.

Monday: Committees will be in session until noon when the State Conservation Commission hosts a noon luncheon. Keynote speaker will be Joe Harkins, director of Natural Resource Policy, from the Governor's office. Luncheon attendees will also hear the Kansas Association of Conservation District Speech contestant winner.

The State Conservation Commission will also recognize district supervisors and employees with 20 years of service.

Luncheon attendees will also hear the first-place speech winner sponsored by the Association's Conservation Education and Youth Committee.

At the afternoon area meetings, two State Conservation Commission commissioners and three Kansas Association of Conservation District directors will be elected.

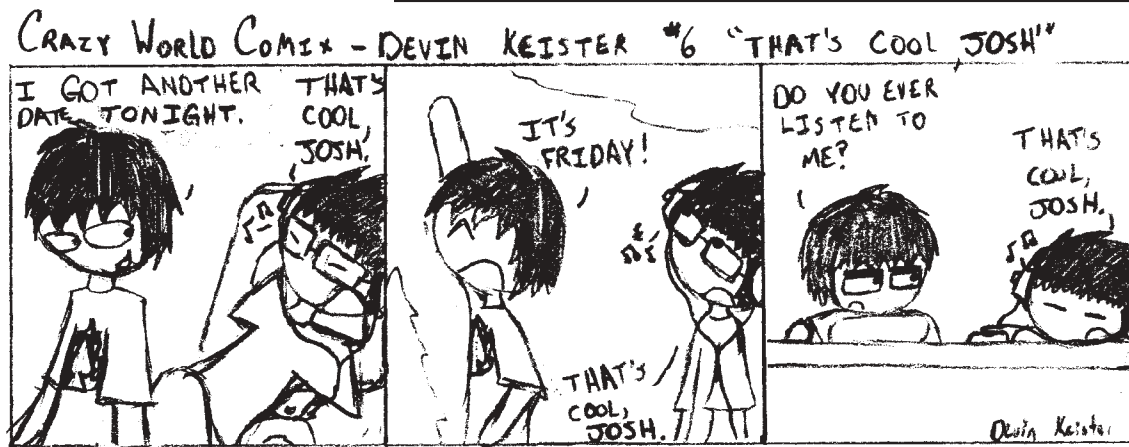
Tuesday: In the morning, supervisors, district managers, and secretaries and others will have the opportunity to attend three of the six break-out sessions. Some sessions attendees can choose from are: Ogallala/High Plains Aquifer, Cover Your Accountability, Watershed Restoration and Protection Strategy, and Capital Development Water Supply Development.

At the Tuesday afternoon business session, committee chairpersons will present resolutions for the conservation district supervisors to vote upon.

The annual convention concludes Tuesday evening with an awards banquet.

Conservation districts are local entities of state government offering a variety of resource conservation programs through technical and financial assistance. Districts play a key role in delivering the federal farm bill programs, as well as state and local natural resource programs. The directors and commissioners oversee their respective organizations' programs and budgetary responsibilities.

Tis the season to trim stress

"Prioritizing your to-do list can reduce holiday stress and free up time for what matters most," said Charlotte Shoup Olsen, Kansas State University Research and Extension family systems specialist.

"Ask yourself, will Aunt Mabel care if every room in the house sparkles?" Ms. Olsen said.

If the truth be told, Aunt Mabel will be happy to be included and children more likely to remember an afternoon baking cookies rather than the time their mother spent polishing furniture, she said.

"Skip unnecessary obligations and focus on what is most important to you and your family," she said. The holidays offer opportunities

that families and friends can enjoy together. A one-on-one shopping trip, during which a child is invited to pick a gift for a family member or holiday toy drive for other children can create a special holiday memory. So can helping a grandparent with shopping or baking, she said.

Working together to rake leaves in your yard or that of a neighbor or friend no longer able to do it and then enjoying a cup of hot chocolate together also can create lasting memories. Such efforts often become holiday rituals or traditions, Ms. Olsen said.

"Flexibility and a willingness to compromise are key, particularly as ages and stages in life change," she

said, who offered this example: Adult children can be pushed and pulled between two or more families, forced to eat two holiday dinners and stressed to the max.

"Consider which is more important: Getting together on a certain day or getting together when everyone can relax and enjoy each other's company?" Ms. Olsen said.

"Take the pressure off and choose a day to create a family holiday. Doing so can reduce stress and make the holiday season more enjoyable. It also provides opportunities for families at any age to create new rituals and traditions that will be meaningful to them," she said.

"Compromise typically builds community."
