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City ordinance published authorizing first amendment

ORDINANCE NO. 529
AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION OF A FIRST AMENDMENT TO THE LOAN AGREEMENT BETWEEN ST. FRANCIS, KANSAS AND THE STATE OF KANSAS, ACTING BY AND THROUGH THE KANSAS DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENT FOR THE PURPOSE OF OBTAINING A LOAN FROM THE KANSAS WATER POLLUTION CONTROL REVOLVING FUND FOR THE PURPOSE OF FINANCING A WASTEWATER TREATMENT PROJECT; ESTABLISHING A DEDICATED SOURCE OF REVENUE FOR REPAYMENT OF SUCH LOAN; AUTHORIZING AND APPROVING CERTAIN DOCUMENTS IN CONNECTION THEREWITH; AND AUTHORIZING CERTAIN OTHER ACTIONS IN CONNECTION WITH THE FIRST AMENDMENT TO THE LOAN AGREEMENT.

WHEREAS, the Federal Water Quality Act of 1987 (the "Federal Act") established revolving fund program for public wastewater treatment systems to assist in financing the costs of infrastructure needed to achieve or maintain compliance with the Federal Act and to protect the public health and authorized the Environmental Protection Agency (the "EPA") to administer a revolving loan program operated by the individual states; and

WHEREAS, to fund the state revolving fund program, the EPA will make annual capitalization grants to the states, on the condition that each state provide a state match for such state's revolving fund; and

WHEREAS, by passage of the Kansas Water Pollution Control Revolving Fund Act, K.S.A. 65-3321 through 65-3329, inclusive (the "Loan Act"), the State of Kansas (the "State") has established the Kansas Water Pollution Control Revolving Fund (the "Revolving Fund") for purposes of the Federal Act; and

WHEREAS, under the Loan Act, the Secretary of the Kansas Department of Health and Environment ("KDHE") is given the responsibility for administration and management of the Revolving Fund; and

WHEREAS, the Kansas Development Finance Authority (the "Authority") and KDHE have entered into a Pledge Agreement (the "Pledge Agreement") pursuant to which KDHE agrees to enter into Loan Agreements with Municipalities for public wastewater treatment projects (the "Projects") and to pledge the Loan Repayments (as defined in the Pledge Agreement) received pursuant to such Loan Agreements to the Authority; and

WHEREAS, the Authority is authorized under K.S.A. 74-8905(a) and the Loan Act to issue revenue bonds (the "Bonds") for the purpose of providing funds to implement the State's requirements under the Federal Act and to loan the same, together with available funds from the EPA capitalization grants, to Municipalities within the State for the payment of Project Costs (as said terms are defined in the Loan Act); and

WHEREAS, St. Francis, Kansas (the "Municipality") is a municipality as said term is defined in the Loan Act which operates a wastewater collection, pumping, and treatment system (the "System"); and

WHEREAS, the System is a public Wastewater Treatment Works, as said term is defined in the Loan Act; and

WHEREAS, the Municipality has, pursuant to the Loan Act, submitted an Application to KDHE to obtain an amendment to the loan from the Revolving Fund to finance the costs of improvements to its System consisting of the following: This project includes manhole replacement (approximately 8), manhole rehabilitation (approximately 34), installation of a new submersible main pump station, installation of an emergency generator, and expansion of the wastewater lagoon system. All necessary piping, electrical improvements and other appurtenance necessary for proper operation are also included (the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, the Municipality has taken all steps necessary and has complied with the provisions of the Loan Act and the provisions of K.A.R. 28-16-110 to 28-16-138 (the "Regulations") applicable thereto necessary to qualify for an amendment to the loan; and

WHEREAS, KDHE has informed the Municipality that it has been approved for a loan in amount of not to exceed Five Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars [\$550,000] (the "Loan") in order to finance the Project; and

WHEREAS, the governing body of the Municipality hereby finds and determines that it is necessary and desirable to accept the First Amendment to the Loan and to enter into a First Amendment to the loan agreement and certain other documents relating thereto, and to take certain actions required in order to implement the First Amendment to the Loan Agreement.

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF ST. FRANCIS, KANSAS:

Section 1. Authorization of the First Amendment to the Loan Agreement. The Municipality is hereby authorized to accept the Loan and to enter into a certain First Amendment to the Loan Agreement, with an effective date of May 24, 2005, with the State of Kansas acting by and through the Kansas Department of Health and Environment (the First Amendment to the "Loan Agreement") to finance the Project Costs (as defined in the First Amendment to the Loan Agreement). The Mayor and Clerk are hereby authorized to execute the First Amendment to the Loan Agreement in substantially the form presented to the governing body this date, with such changes or modifications thereto as may be approved by the Mayor and the City Attorney, the Mayor's execution of the First Amendment to the Loan Agreement being conclusive evidence of such approval.

Section 2. Establishment of Dedicated Source of Revenue for Repayment of Loan. Pursuant to the Loan Act, the Municipality hereby establishes a dedicated source of revenue for repayment of the Loan. In accordance therewith, the Municipality shall impose and collect such rates, fees and charges for the use and services furnished by or through the System, including all improvements and additions thereto hereafter constructed or acquired by the Municipality as will provide System Revenues or levy ad valorem taxes without limitation as to rate or amount upon all the taxable tangible property, real or personal, within the territorial limits of the Municipality to produce amounts which are sufficient to (a) pay the cost of the operation and maintenance of the System, (b) pay the principal of and interest on the Loan as and when the same become due, and (c) pay all other amounts due at any time under the Loan Agreement; provided, however, no lien or other security interest is granted by the Municipality to KDHE on the System Revenues under this Agreement. In the event that the System Revenues are insufficient to meet the obligations under the Loan and the Loan Agreement, the Municipality shall levy ad valorem taxes without limitation as to rate or amount upon all the taxable tangible property, real or personal, within the territorial limits of the Municipality to produce the amounts necessary for the prompt payment of the obligations under the Loan and Loan Agreement.

In accordance with the Loan Act, the obligations under the Loan and the First Amendment to the Loan Agreement shall not be included within any limitation on the bonded indebtedness of the Municipality.

Section 3. Further Authority. The Mayor, Clerk and other City officials are hereby further authorized and directed to execute any and all documents and take such actions as they may deem necessary or advisable in order to carry out and perform the purposes of the Ordinance, and to make alterations, changes or additions in the foregoing agreements, statements, instruments and other documents herein approved, authorized and confirmed which they may approve, and the execution or taking of such action shall be conclusive evidence of such necessity or advisability.

Section 4. Governing Law. The Ordinance and the First Amendment to the Loan Agreement shall be governed exclusively by and construed in accordance with the applicable laws of the State of Kansas.

Section 5. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after its passage by the governing body of the City and publication in the official City newspaper.

Alvin Henry Hempeler

Alvin Henry Hempeler was born to Louis Hempeler and Sophie Marie (Antholz) Hempeler in Cook, Neb., on May 11, 1906. He died June 13 at the age of 99 years, one month and two days.

During his early years, the family lived in northern Minnesota and Iowa. Alvin completed the eighth grade in Keosauqua, Iowa, in 1920. Shortly thereafter, the family moved to the rural Bird City, Kan., area.

Alvin was confirmed March 1921, at St. John Lutheran Church by Reverend Louis Sittler.

At about age 14, Alvin took over the majority of the farm work while his father did carpentry work. He continued farming on the family farm where he lived with his sister, Lottie, until 1981.

At that time the brother and sister moved into a home in Bird City.

Alvin was a faithful member of St. John Lutheran Church. He attended church with Lottie even after his hearing deteriorated to the point that he could not hear the service.

Alvin was a member of the Tri-State Antique Engine Association and donated one of his tractors, a Minneapolis Moline - U to the association. Alvin was inventive, active, and enjoyed life with a good sense of humor. He was an avid reader and patronized the church library as well as the Bird City Library.

In July 2003, ill health caused Alvin and Lottie to move to the Good Samaritan Village in St. Francis where he died.

Alvin was preceded in death by his parents. He leaves his sister, Lottie, and some cousins to mourn his passing.

Funeral services were held June 16, at St. John Lutheran Church, Bird City, with Reverend Ron Roberts officiating.

The family lived in Colorado, moved to Benkelman, Neb., and back to Colorado. After failing health, she moved to the Good Samaritan Village and lived there until her death.

One of Fannie's greatest joys were her grandchildren and great-grand-

children. She was there for many of their births, and if not, was there shortly after. If there was an event that the grandkids were involved in, she would be there watching and cheering them on.

She was a member of the Stitch and Chat Extension Club and the Sunflower Quilting Club. Fannie loved to quilt, embroidery and to sing. Even after Alzheimer's took its toll, she could still remember the words to every song.

Fannie attended church at the Evergreen United Brethren Church, the Federated Church in McDonald and the Baptist Church in Benkelman.

She was preceded in death by her husband; her parents; her brothers, Russell, Donald and Raymond; sister, Norma; sister-in-law, Alice David; and brothers-in-law, Blaine Lamb and Gene Stamm.

Dr. Ernest Richard Cram,

April 1, 1924 - June 19, 2005

Dr. Ernest Richard (Dick) Cram, M.D., age 81, St. Francis, Kan., died at the Cheyenne County Hospital on Father's Day, June 19, 2005. A celebration of his life will be held on

Wednesday, June 22, at 2 p.m. at the Peace Lutheran Church in St. Francis.

Dr. Cram was born April 1, 1924, in St. Francis, to Ole Robert and Elizabeth Mary (Ringo) Cram. He attended the St. Francis community schools; Kansas State University 1942-43; University of New Mexico, pre-meteorology certificate 1943; University of Kansas, bachelor of arts, pre-medicine 1946-49; University of Kansas, doctor of medicine 1948-52; California Institute of Technology, Master of Science, meteorol-

ogy 1952; Medical Rotating Internship, Air Force Lieutenant, Fitzsimmons Army Hospital, Denver 1952-53.

His service in the armed forces included meteorologist and Lieutenant, Army Air Corps Reserves 1943-1946. After finishing medical school, here-enlisted as a physician, Lieutenant, Air Force Reserves, Westover Air Force Base, Chicopee Falls, Mass., 1953-54.

Dr. Cram married Bonnie Jean Waters on Aug. 29, 1948, and they have five children: Richard Lloyd; Ione Beth Slattery; Claudia Kay Bunker; Ole Robert, III; and Adele Elizabeth DeGood. There was a 20-year span between their oldest and youngest child.

Activities included flying his airplane, reading, golf, violin playing, singing, dramatic and comedic acting, writing and genealogy. He was a patron of the arts.

Dr. Cram practiced private family medicine in St. Francis, from 1954-1992. During these years he served as county coroner 1954-92; Cheyenne County Health Officer 1970-1992; Emergency Medical Technician Instructor 1980-1992; Cheyenne County Ambulance Supervisor 1991-1992; Cheyenne County Medical Staff President and Chief of Staff several variable terms 1955-1992; member Kansas Academy of Family Practice and American Academy of Family Practice; member Flying Physicians Association; member St. Francis High School and District School Board 1955-1975; president, St. Francis Rotary Club; Chamber of Commerce life member and president; Board of High Plains Mental Health Center, Hays, KS; member of the First Christian Church; Boy Scouts of America (BSA) Commit-

teeman 1954-1989; BSA Neighborhood Commissioner of Buffalo Bill District; BSA Buffalo Bill District Chairman 1958-1960; and Scoutmaster Troop 120 1964-1965.

Dr. Cram received the award of Eagle Scout in 1942. The Coronado Area Council awarded Dr. Cram the Silver Beaver certificate in 1965 and the Wood Badge certificate in 1967.

Dr. Cram was a private pilot with a single engine airplane, commercial and instrument ratings. He logged 3341 hours and was owner of a Beechcraft Sierra. He was active in the Civil Air Patrol as a captain and as a medical officer. He was member of Aircraft Owners and Pilots Association; Experimental Aircraft Association Senior Federal Aviation Medical Examiner; Accident Investigator; Director of Cheyenne County State Bank, St. Francis, 1955-94; Republican Party Precinct Committeeman and District State Delegate; and the Western Plains Arts Association of Kansas.

As a young violinist, he played in the University of Kansas Orchestra and later in Pride of the Prairie Orchestra where he rehearsed weekly in Colby. Dr. Cram enjoyed acting and performed in *Fiddler on the Roof*, *Hello Dolly*, *Music Man*, *Dust on the Sunflowers*, and *The Remarkable Mr. Pennypacker*.

He wrote his own autobiography entitled "Sainty's Dick Cram" in 1994 during his retirement. A copy of the book may be found in the St. Francis Library and the Cheyenne County Museum.

Dr. Cram and his wife Bonnie pre-

ogized a number of programs written by Bonnie. The two of them performed these programs in their hometown of St. Francis as well as surrounding communities. These programs included singing, telling family stories, and humorous dramas. They also performed violin and voice duets.

Bonnie and "Doc" loved flying their airplane, "Love Baby" and one of their trips included flying to the Caribbean Islands with 31 other doctors. They were the only ones flying a single engine plane. The journey from St. Francis to St. Thomas of the Caribbean Islands was 50 hours of flying time, round trip. After selling his airplane, golfing with Bonnie became his passion. Bonnie and Dr. Cram (Dick) loved to travel and took many wonderful family trips as well as attending medical conferences which added "zest" to living in St. Francis.

Dr. Cram was a great family man and he loved St. Francis. He delivered approximately 1,000 babies in his career, including his youngest children Ole and Adele as well as Adele's husband, Darris DeGood. Dr. Cram also had the privilege of delivering Julian Bunker, his first grandson, on his own birthday, April 1.

When Dr. Cram chose to practice medicine in St. Francis, there were five other family physicians practicing in Cheyenne County. However, Dr. Cram said, "I think if I practice good medicine, we can live wherever we want to live and I want to live in St. Francis."

His philosophy as a doctor was summed up by a quote from his book "I have always tried to serve as I would like to be served myself and have always been negative toward unnecessary doctoring."

His family would like to share a few of his favorite quotes which he shared frequently as a husband, doctor and father.
