The Kansas Department of Commerce announced that 17 Kansas communities will share a total of \$5,652,973 in federally funded water and sewer grants through the Small Cities Community Development Block Grant program. These Kansas communities will match the Community Development Block Grant's contribution with \$14,183,762 in other funds.

With these grant awards, the Community Development Block Grant program will assist 18,440 Kansas residents – 10,170 of whom have low and moderate incomes.

The deadline for filing for one of the seats on Bird City or St. Francis city councils and Cheylin or St. Francis school boards is noon on Tuesday, Jan. 23. The position of mayor of St. Francis will also be up for election.

Terry Miller, county election officer, reported that those filing are coming in slowly. As of Tuesday, the two present city council members up for election, Dale Weeks and Roger Jensen, along with mayor Scott Schultz have filed. St. Francis Board of Education members filing for another term are Bonnie Zweygardt and Sherry Weeks.

In Bird City, only Frank Serrano whose terms are up are: Roger and Loren White have filed for the Jensen and Dale Weeks, councilposition of city council. No one has men; and Scott Schultz, mayor. filed for the Cheylin Board of Edu-

Those filing will need to either pay a \$5 fee or submit a petition with the required amount of signatures. If the candidate is thinking of submitting a petition, he or she should check with the county clerk to find out the number of signatures needed as there are different numbers for each city and school board.

It should be noted, that after a candidate has filed for an office, he cannot withdraw his name after the last date provided by law for filing for such candidacy.

There are a number of positions open in both cities on both the school and city boards. In both cities, the council can have any number of candidates running but only the seats which are up for election will be filled by the candidates with the

most votes in the April 1 election. To run for a seat on the city council, the candidate must live within

the city limits.

School board elections have different rules and if there are more than three candidates running in a district, there will be a primary election on Feb. 27, eliminating the extra candidates.

There are also different districts in the school district and to run for a certain position, the candidate must live in that district. A map showing the districts can be obtained at the county clerk's office.

Murder case reopened after 33 years

A Colorado cold case has reopened memories of der for area relatives. Agnes Burk of

Herbert Frye Bird City said she has known for over a year that authorities were investigating her

sister's murder again. On June 9, 1973, 45-year-old Elizabeth "Betty" Frye was found bludgeoned to death in the garage of her home in Littleton, Colo. Herbert Duane Frye, her husband, was origicharges were dropped due to the lack of evidence.

However, the 81-year-old Mr. brought the indictment forward. Frye surrendered to Arapahoe County authorities on Tuesday, Jan. 9. He was then freed on \$100,000 bail and returned to his home in Summerfield, Fla.

He is scheduled to appear in court at 1:30 p.m. on March 15.

Arapahoe County Sheriff Grayson Robinson discussed the case in a Jan. 10 Rocky Mountain News article by Ivan Moreno.

"This is an example of what a cold case investigation is about," said Sheriff Robinson.

He said investigators from the county's Cold Case Squad interviewed people in five cities throughout the United States in September. He could not discuss evidence they found, saying only that "it was a lot of small pieces of information" that

Mrs. Frye is survived by six sisters, Mrs. Burk, Jean Brickell of Denver, Thelma Phifer of Ft. Collins, Delores Graff of McCook, and Lucene Krueger and Janice Brown of California.

She was born, Elizabeth Kathrine Orten, in Beardsley in 1928 and graduated from Girls Catholic High School in Hays. After attending Hays State College she moved to
