By Lezlie McCormick Committee reports were given when the Cheyenne County Fair Board met Thursday night.


The Demolition Derby Committee reported that the derby is on schedule and the rules will be the same as last year's. There will be the same judging crew as last year, however the head judge will be from Salina. The price for the grandstands will be \$10 and \$15 for a pit pass regardless of age.

The board discussed keeping the parking to one row deep around the arena. When there are too many vehicles, it is hard to get the derby cars around. Vehicles will still be able to park outside of the cable.

Lawn mower races Member Clay Zimbelman brought rules for the lawn mowers which are the same as the National Lawn Mower Race Association. There were some minor changes to simplify the rules. This is the first year for the races. Once the committee knows how many mowers are coming and what the interest is, Mr. Zimbelman said they will need to be decided on the number of classes.

# County 911 tenant maps have arrived county. While they don't need to in 2006 was signed for Dan no way that all liability could be re-By Karen Krien

The appraiser office staff told the commissioners at their Thursday meeting that the new county tenant maps with the emergency numbering were done and they had ordered 300.

Bonnie Zweygardt and Deb Smith, appraiser staff, said they had distributed 100 to emergency and law personnel but they still had 200 which they would sell to help pay for the \$1,000 cost of printing.

The maps will be available in the clerk's office and the cost of the maps will be decided later.

The staff noted that, as people move, they will need to go to the appraiser's office and they will be given an address. That address will then need to be taken to the post office.

Troy Gardner, sheriff, said the \$200,000 grant for 911 upgrades should be available soon. He said he planned to move the equipment and dispatchers from the St. Francis city power plant to the former sheriff's office in the courthouse. (The sheriff's office was moved to the city office)

When the 911 dispatch was first located in the power plant, it was because there were employees working there 24-hour a day. However, as time passed, the 911 calls were increasing and it is not fair to have employees running \$1 million machines when someone's life is in danger.

Following training, Carol Gamblin will oversee the 911 dispatch office.

### Sheriff's report

Sheriff Gardner had gotten a bid for a new Ford pickup for the force. He said he would be trading off the 1999 Blazer and 2003 Explorer. The commissioners asked about getting a second bid even though there is no other dealer in the

take the lowest bid, it would be good to compare. Mr. Gardner said that, going out of town would pose a problem for servicing the vehicle.

He said that he would like to get on a plan to trade off a vehicle when it had around 70,000 miles because there would be a better trade-in value. Sheriff Gardner will come to the next meeting with the two bids.

The sheriff said officer Craig Van Allen was up for the next level of pay increase. The commissioners agreed to the increase.

The agreement for providing law enforcement between the county and the city of St. Francis was signed.

### Emergency management

Gary Rogers, county emergency manager, said he was concerned about the ways things were changing with the Salvation Army and Red Cross when it came to funding.

"It is getting harder and harder to access their funding," he said.

When the Thanksgiving snowstorm stranded travelers in St. Francis, the Salvation Army was able to provide funds to pay the school for the food used. However, if there was another blizzard, he wasn't sure that money would be available. He asked that the county budget money for the purpose of helping with expenses if there was another blizzard or emergency.

He said he has been working closely with the Red Cross. If there is an emergency and agreements have not been established with the organization, it will not help out. Then the county would be totally responsible.

The commissioners will discuss the matter with the county auditor.

#### Noxious weed department

Commissioner Ernie Ketzner wanted to know if the county was gaining on prairie dog control. Mr. Schlittenhardt said letters had been sent to those with serious dog problems but the weather had not permitted much prairie dog control.

The commissioners signed a highway contract allowing Mr. Schlittenhardt to spray for noxious weeds along state highways. The rate of \$25 per hour for the operator and \$35 for the equipment will remain the same as it was last year.

Commissioner Andy Beikman asked Mr. Schlittenhardt to keep a log of his work schedule. That way, if people call, the commissioners to discuss personnel. Coming out of would be able to tell people who ask exactly what he was doing and where he was working.

# Ambulance department

Jannelle Bowers, emergency medical service director, asked what the commissioners wanted to do with the old repeaters and antennas taken out of the building east of Wheeler. They said to ask Gary Rogers, emergency manager.

Those installing the repeater equipment said there was a serious problem with rodents. They suggested that the equipment be covered with metal instead of wood to keep the rats and mice out of it.

moved as, when there is deep snow, it is hard telling where there are curbs and other items which could be destroyed. There is also the problem of ruining one of the grader tires.

They did agree that if there is a medical emergency, the county will help clear the drive and the crew will not leave a ridge in front of the drive.

The county has spent many hours keeping the roads open and removing snow. He said he needed new grader tires and this time, he planned to get an all-season tire. He said the tires are better and it will be money well spent.

He called for an executive session the meeting, the commissioners said no decision had been made.

### **Bunker gear** for Bird City

Tom Raile, member of the Bird City Fire Department, said the firemen need new bunker gear. Some of the gear is five years old but the majority of it is up to 20 years old.

One set of bunker gear is around \$2,000. The department needs 23 or 24 sets of gear. Mr. Raile said they had contacted a company which sells the gear and they have a person who will write a grant. There was around a 60-percent chance that the grant would be awarded. If the city gets the grant, it would pay for 95 percent with the county picking up the other 5 percent.

The commissioners agreed to see if they could get the grant.

# Appraiser's office

Randy Sangster, county attorney, asked that his office staff be given a 5-percent raise for their work in getting the maps, numbers and other information for the 911 system. The commissioners said that the sheriff's and road and bridge offices had also spent additional time in this area and they, like the appraiser's office staff, got a 3 percent raise. It was not fair to the appraiser's staff to get more.

Commissioner Beikman, before the meeting, had asked Clerk Miller to check on the number of hours worked in the appraiser's office in 2006 compared to those worked in 2005. He had found that the staff had actually worked more hours in 2005 than in 2006.
