GENERAL NOTICE TO CON-TROL NOXIOUS WEEDS

The Kansas Noxious Weed Law K.S.A. 2-1314 et seg reguires all persons who own or supervise land in Kansas to control and eradicate all weeds declared noxious by legislative action. The weeds declared noxious are: field bindweed, musk thistle, sericea lespedeza, johnson grass, bur ragweed, Canada thistle, leafy spurge, hoary cress, quack grass, Russian knapweed, kudzu and pignut. Bull thistle is a County Option Noxious Weed/Weeds declared noxious by the Board of County Commissioners of Cheyenne County. Notice is hereby given pursuant to the Kansas Noxious Weed Law to every person who owns or supervises land in Cheyenne County that noxious weeds growing or found on such land shall be controlled and eradicated. Control is defined as preventing the production of viable seed and the vegetative spread of the plant.

Failure to observe this notice may result in the County:

1. Serving a legal notice requiring control of the noxious weeds within a minimum of five days. Failure to control the noxious weeds within the time period allowed may result in the county treating the noxious weeds at the landowners expense and placing a lien on the property if the bill is not paid within 30 days or,

2. Filing criminal charges for non compliance. Conviction for non compliance may result in a fine of \$100 per day of non-compliance with a maximum fine of \$1500.

The public is also hereby notified that it is a violation of the Kansas Noxious Weed Law to barter, sell or give away infested nursery stock or livestock feed unless the feed is fed on the farm where grown or sold to a commercial processor that will destroy the viability of the noxious weed seed. Custom harvesting machines must be labeled with a label provided by the Kansas Dept. of Agriculture and must be free of all weed seed and litter when entering the State and when leaving a field infested with noxious weeds. 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## Notice published for Emergency system is discussed again

The Cheyenne County Commissioners met on Thursday and the 911 emergency system was again on the agenda. No decision was made but the sheriff will call a meeting of the present dispatchers so there will be more information available in the near future.

The duties of the dispatchers, as well as the salaries, were discussed. Commissioner Andy Beikman said that it had been pointed out that dispatchers would make more money than many of the county employees. Sheriff Troy Gardner said that there would be times when nothing was going on but when there was, they needed good, competent people handling the job.

At an earlier meeting, he said that the dispatcher's salary needed to be attractive enough to keep them in the county.

Mr. Beikman said he had spent considerable time trying to think of a service which all people use in the county which a tax could be added to help fund the new 911 system. He didn't think it was fair that landowners share the brunt of the expense. The only thing he could think of was the electricity service. It was noted that the different services in the county would need to cooperate. No decision was made.

When there was "down time" in the dispatcher's office, the sheriff said there would be lots of paperwork, transcribing reports and dispatching calls to different agencies. He said that all calls, when officers go out and emergency runs need to be documented. The dispatcher will need to be able to multi-task.

Sheriff Gardner said several inquiries about the dispatcher duties had been received. Some wanted only part-time work. He said that the parttime workers should be considered as it would cut down in the salary expenses as part-time workers would not be paid benefits. They could also be used to work the different schedules and fill in when there is sickness and other emergencies. However, all would need to be trained.

to training in April. Sheriff Gardner said that Mrs. Gamblin already knows a lot because of her training in the sheriff's office and was still recommending that she be the dispatch supervisor.

It had been suggested that the dispatch system be under a separate board and not under the sheriff's office. The sheriff said that, to begin with, it wouldn't cost any more for it to be under the sheriff's office but in the future, the commissioners might consider having it be a separate department and would answer to a voluntary board. They talked about the original blue prints of the courthouse that had been found but Greg Kite, who is writing the grant, took the prints with him. Mr. Porter questioned whether or not the steps had been granite because of the way the stone was put in and the brick veneer was placed on top of the step caps.
