Disaster struck as fire consumed the farm house of Tommy Herring on Thursday afternoon, March 22. Three area fire departments responded although the home was gutted by the flames.

Fire departments from Bird City, St. Francis and Benkelman arrived at the property, located near the Republican River and less than a mile from the Nebraska line. Bird City and Benkelman firemen fought the blaze while St. Francis backed them

The two story, stucco building soon became fully engulfed. About 12 residents were safely evacuated. Many rounds of ammunition, stored in the structure, exploded as the firemen and members of the St. Francis Sheriff's Department worked the

The walls remained standing after the fire, but the house was a to-




