

Historical Society grant received for courthouse steps

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Terry Miller, county clerk, reported Monday that the Kansas State Historical Society has awarded Cheyenne County a Heritage Trust Fund Grant of \$78,384 to replace the steps on the courthouse. The steps will be replaced with limestone, the same material which was originally used when the courthouse was built in 1924.

The estimated cost of the project is \$97,000. The county will pay the remaining \$18,616. The cost for the and did it for no cost. county will be less than it would have been to run concrete steps.

Greg Kite, former St. Francis resident and the person who was responsible for trying to restore the steps back to their original state, said there were 68 grants submitted and only 19 were funded.
