The annual Cheyenne County Wheat Field Day has been set for 5:30 p.m. on Wednesday, June 20, at the test plot 4 miles south of Wheeler on K-27, then 1/4 mile west. Junior, Tom and Matt Smull are the cooperators.

Speaking will be Jeanne Falk, multi-county agronomist; Jim Shroyer, crop production specialist; Brian Olson, northwest area agronomist; and Dan O'Brien, northwest area ag economist. They will be discussing three different studies at the plot: 1) the 20 varieties; 2) the comparisons of four varieties each planted in conventional and no-till plots; and 3) certified seed vs farmer saved seed.

Accident claims life of young man

A young Rawlins County man was killed last Wednesday morning in a tragic workplace accident. Benjamin (Ben) Brogan, 30, died of injuries he sustained in an accident at Beaver Valley High School. Supply Co., east of Atwood. The accident took place at 9 a.m.,

According to Scott Chvatal, the company's vice president, Brogan was part of a work crew that was in the process of setting up a hay rake when a piece of equipment fell off a forklift and landed on him.

He was taken by ambulance to the Rawlins County Health Center, where he died from his injury. The staff at Beaver Valley were shocked and deeply saddened by the death of the young yard crewman, who had been employed at the supply business since March

In the short time he had worked at the company, he had become popular with everyone at the business, according to the

vice president.

"He was a very good employee," Chvatal said Friday. "Everyone liked him."

Brogan, who was an accomplished athlete in high school, was a 1996 graduate of Cheylin

Funeral services were held Saturday at Redeemer Lutheran Church with Pastor Don White officiating. Interment was in Grace Cemetery in
