Road work ends soon

It's hot — good weather for laying asphalt," said Dave Flemming, county road and bridge supervisor.

Venture Corporation, Great Bend, has been laying asphalt on U.S. 36 as well as putting asphalt on the asphalt on the River Road south of St. Francis and extending the oil for another mile.

Mr. Flemming said the highway has been completed. When they finish the River Road, there will be around 2 inches on part of the road already paved and the extended work will have 4-inches new asphalt.
