# **Commissioners discuss** new 911 system at meeting

The Cheyenne County Commissioners and St. Francis City Council met Friday to discuss the new 911 system. Scott Schultz, St. Francis mayor, said the council was there to make sure the commissioners knew they supported the plans for the 911 system. They all agreed that communication about the project between the cities and county is impor-

The new 911 system will be moved Jan. 1 from the St. Francis power plant to the old sheriff's office. The equipment is supposed to be coming sometime in October. It should be up and ready in December. This would give time for testing before the Jan. 1 starting date. The enhanced 911 system will not be implemented until March 15. The commissioners said Jim

O'Loughlin, Allied Information Solutions, the company which has been contracted to set up the equipment and make sure it is working, will be in St. Francis to attend a commissioners' meeting in September.

The St. Francis council had agreed to pay wages and benefits for those dispatchers who will be coming over to the new system until the end of December. Andy Beikman, commissioner chairman, said the county will then take over the wages and benefits.
