

Golf tournament set for Sept. 15

Summer is coming to an end but not without the fifth annual "Swing For Your Health" golf tournament sponsored by the Cheyenne County Hospital. The tournament will be held on Sept. 15 with registration beginning at 7:30 a.m. and tee-off at 8:30 a.m. Teams may also register at the door the day of the tournament.

The tournament is a four-person scramble. There will be team prizes as well as special event prizes for:

- Hole 1 - shortest drive.
- Hole 2 - shortest iron.
- Hole 3 - closest to pin on second shot.
- Hole 4 - hole-in-one.
- Hole 5 - longest putt.
- Hole 6 - closest to the outhouse.
- Hole 7 - closest to pin.
- Hole 8 - longest putt.
- Hole 9 - longest drive.

There will be a variety of door prizes given out. Every participant will also be given a "free wedge certificate" worth \$200. The only cost

is the shipping and handling.

In 2005, there were 45 businesses and individuals sponsoring the tournament and \$6,200 was raised toward the purchase of a surgical electrocautery unit. This piece of equipment is used to control bleeding and cut tissue during surgery.

This year, the money raised through the tournament will go toward an infant warmer for the labor and delivery room and the obstetric program. The warmer will cost around \$9,000.

There will be a free-will donation lunch of roast beef to be served at Riverside Dining at noon. Family members of participants are welcome to attend.

There are three levels of sponsorships: \$50 - Bronze sponsor; \$100 - Silver sponsor; and \$350 - Gold sponsor.

On Aug. 25, the ladies started off their season at the Healy tournament. They played Brewster and lost the match 13-25, 7-25. The next match of the day was against Ingalls, and the girls played well and took their opponent to three games before losing 17-25, 27-25 and 13-25. They fell flat during their last match of the day against Healy, losing 17-25, 15-25.

The next week the girls traveled to Grainfield to participate in a quad. Once again they played Brewster and fell short 11-25, 17-25. The second match the Ladies played Grinnell/Wheatland and lost 12-25, 11-25. The final game against Triplains Vikings was very close with scores of 25-22 23-25 and 24-26.

The Lady Cougars played some of their toughest games at Atwood's triangular Tuesday, Aug. 30.

Coming out very strong in the Sharon Springs game, the girls won 25-22 in the first game of the match. The second game was very close (24-26) and the last game against Sharon ended 21-25.

Saturday the team played in a tournament at Trenton. The results were as follows: Cheylin vs. Arapahoe 24-26 and 13-25 and Cheylin vs. Wauneta-Palisade 25-27 and 23-25.

"The games were definitely teeth clinchers with neck-and-neck

scores. We just got to get over that hump and we are there." Coach Beeson said.

Volleyball games to look forward to include: Friday Sept. 14 preceding the football game at Benkelman starting at 6 p.m.; at 4 p.m. on Tuesday, Sept. 18 there is a triangular at Rexford; and during Homecoming

Cheylin will play Heartland starting with junior varsity games at 5:30 followed by varsity.

The quad games' results from Tuesday will be announced later.

"Check your calendars to see if any of these dates work for you, as we greatly appreciate the support," Coach Beeson said.
