Ann, the fifth of six children, was born on Jan. 3, 1950, to Elsie Pauline Miller (Cook) and Robert Curtis Miller at the Cheyenne County Hospital in St. Francis. She grew up on the family farm 8 miles north of St. Francis.

In April of 1966, she was married to David Lynn Wright and they were blessed with two children, Tina Ann and Robert Lynn.

In her younger years, some of the things she enjoyed were spending time with her family, racing motorcycles, bowling, playing cards, cooking and working at Harland's Grill. One of her favorite things to make was banana cream pie, which was a delicious memory of everyone who ate a piece. She also loved knitting which she continued to do throughout her years and was quite an accomplishment being blind.

In March of 1977, she had a tragic vehicle accident that left her blind, mentally and physically handicapped. She spent four years

at the Good Samaritan Village in St. Francis and in 1981, she was moved to Goodland to Golden West Skills Center where she was cared for the rest of her living years. Ann lived in the Golden West

facility until 1998 at which point she moved into her own home in the Goodland community with three other patients and 24-hour supervision from home workers employed by Golden West. Her home family consisted of Jean Gaschler, Carrie Babcock and Tonya Heinrich. One of her closest companions

in the last seven years was house manager, Merla Staehnke, employed by Golden West, who spent a lot of extra time with her, bringing her to St. Francis to have lunch with her family, going to concerts, shopping and doing special things with Ann that they both enjoyed.

Ann was always happy, loved to laugh and make others laugh. She was always easy going and when asking what she wanted to do, her reply was always "whatever." She had a lot of little sayings that she repeated to her family all the time. One of her favorites was "supercalifragilisticexpialidocious" and she could spell it both forward and


