Friday cutoff date for farm program

The Natural Resources Conserva- and Air Quality tion Service (NRCS) has announced Friday, Nov. 2, as the cutoff date for the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) applications to be considered for Fiscal Year Overdraft; Insufficient Water Flows (FY) 2008 funding.

New Self-Assessment Worksheets

When farmers or ranchers apply for 2008 the Environmental Quality Incentives Program funding, they will be required to fill out the Kansas Self-Assessment Worksheet.

"If they plan to apply, they should start the process very soon if they haven't done so already," Mr. Klaege, Environmental Quality Incentives Program, said.

"The self-assessment worksheet is an educational tool," he explained, "providing landowners with a clear indication of what natural resource concerns they have, what they can accomplish, and what they need to do to qualify for the program.

"We see the worksheets as a timesaving and money-saving tool," said Mr. Klaege.

Limited Resource and

"The program is available to help address the unique circumstances and concerns of limited resource and beginning farmers and ranchers, who have natural resource concerns that need to be addressed on their land," Mr. Klaege said.

"In Kansas limited resource and beginning farmers and ranchers may receive a higher payment rate through Incentives Program for structural and vegetative practices.'

Kansas Identifies Priority Natural Resource Concerns

The fiscal year 2008 Kansas eligible priority natural resource concerns are as follows:

Forestland Health—Productivity, Health, Vigor

Grazing Lands Health-Productivity, Health, Vigor; Noxious or Invasive Plants; and Inadequate Stockwater

Soil Condition—Organic Matter Depletion

Livestock Waste - Water Quality

Water Quality - Nutrients/Pesti-

cides/Suspended Sediment Water Quantity - Inefficient Water Use on Irrigated Land; Aquifer in Water Courses

Cutoff Date Set to Evaluate Applications

"After Nov. 2, Natural Resources Conservation Service staff will begin evaluating applications received in Kansas. All contracts will be signed and obligated with producers by Jan. 25," Mr. Klaege, said.

The service will evaluate each application and give higher priority to those applications that use costeffective conservation practices; treat multiple resource concerns; address national, state, or local priorities; and provide the most environmental benefits.

Review of 2007 Funding

Kansas received over \$23.9 million in FY 2007, and over 1,600 contracts were funded. More than 2,900 applications were received.

In Kansas, the funds will help farmers and ranchers install conservation practices that improve and protect Kansas's priority natural resource concerns.

Apply at Local Office




