The Cheyenne County Commission will hold a public hearing on, Tuesday, October 16, 2007, at 12:45 p.m. at the County Commission Room, Cheyenne County Courthouse, 212 Washington, St. Francis, Kansas, for the purpose of considering an application to be submitted to the Kansas Department of Commerce for Small Cities Community Development Block Grant funds under the Community Facilities category. A specific project application to be discussed is the purchase of a full size Type II

Ambulance/Emergency Vehicle for the Cheyenne County EMS Department, to serve an area bounded by the service area of the department's Bird City station (Bird City Township, including the City of Bird City, within Cheyenne County). The estimated total project cost is \$142,000 with the grant request for \$71,000 of the project cost. Other project proposals introduced at the hearing will be considered.
