Fire sweeps through almost 300 acres

The wind had blown all day Thursday, sometimes reaching 60mile-an-hour gusts. At about 2 p.m., the firemen were called to put out a grass fire north of St. Francis. The fire jumped several country roads, two asphalt roads and the railroad

tracks before it was stopped. "It has been dry and, with the wind and high humidity levels, the fire traveled fast," said George Harper, St. Francis fire chief.

He said the fire was "electrical" and, at the time, was unsure if a line had broken in the wind or if wires had touched, causing a spark.

When the firemen reached the fire, it had already traveled about a half mile and was just north of Benny Weber's house at Road 15. It swiftly traveled down a wide ravine, east of the sewer ponds, and on east of the St. Francis Cemetery. The wind was from the north/northwest but it seemed to shift from time to time.

The Charlie Draper place seemed to be in the line of the fire for awhile but it moved east where Steve and Deb Christy had horses and cattle in a pasture. It burned much of the pasture but the animals were able to reach an area that did not burn. Todd Krien's horses were within a 1/4 mile of the fire.

The fire jumped the old Wheeler Road which is asphalt. The Bracelin brothers had cattle in that pasture and Rodney Bracelin cut the fence wires so the cattle could be moved to an adjoining pasture.

Now, the homes of Jo Hagney, Rick and Laura Reeser, Dr. Brett and Cynthia Poling and Eddy and Sherry Schultz were near the path of the fire.

Both Ms. Hagney and Mrs. Reeser had climbed up to one of the sand piles west of their home only to turn around to see the fire almost on top of them. They ran to their house

where they were met by Bird City firemen, Gary Brubaker and Craig White, who told them to evacuate "now!"

"We were terrified," Ms. Hagney

Firemen and other volunteers had let the animals out at Reeser's so they could seek safety.

The Sherman County Firemen had been stationed on U.S. 36. From a distance, the black and sometimes green smoke billowed into the sky between the Wheeler Road and U.S. 36, which had been blocked to keep traffic out.

Traffic was backed up on both roads. Some of the people were those out seeing what was going on while others, including a huge oversized load, several semi trucks and farm equipment, sat on K-27 waiting for the blockade to lift.

The fire moved southeast, barely missing the Ed Morris place and, at that point, jumped across the

Chief Harper said that Sherman County firemen were able to put out the fire before it could spread further.

He said the support during the fire was tremendous. Fire departments came from Hale, Colo., and Bird City to fight the fire and there were other departments standing by. Anyone having big trucks to haul water arrived; the county, Goodland Greenline and farmers supplied equipment and manpower to plow up ground for a fire line. Local law enforcement, state troopers and emergency medical technicians were also there to lend a hand.

Even though many acres burned in the fire, there was no structural damage, there was only one injury when a fireman fell and no animals were lost. During the fire, power was lost in the country and some of St. Francis. Radio power was also down momentarily until the standby batteries at the tower

kicked in.

"Since the fire, we have had phone calls and people thanking us for being there," he said. "It's a good feeling."

Wal-Mart and Presto Convenience Store, Goodland, donated bottled water and Gatorade. Salvation Army provided money and St. Francis Supers donated food and bottled water.

After the fire, Judy McKee, from the Goodland Community Emergency Response Team, was there along with Dolores Jenik, Salvation Army coordinator, Mary Rath, Deb Lindsten, Susan Dinkel, Carol Rogers and Deb Harper, to serve food to the firemen..

Although the fire appeared to be out, the area was patrolled much of the night. Law officers reported a hot spot on a railroad bridge about 3 a.m. on Friday and Chief Harper went out to extinguish it.

Bid for Courthouse steps comes in too high

house have been closed since December when they were deemed "unsafe." The county had received a grant for \$78,384 from the Kansas State Historical Society to restore the steps to their original state of limestone. The county's cost would be around \$20,000.

However, when the bid was opened at the Oct. 16 Cheyenne County Commissioners' meeting, it was too high.

Eric Johnson and Darrin Saenger, representing Campbell and Johnson, an engineering company out of Concordia, were

at the meeting. The company had been hired to oversee the steps job and they were there to discuss the process of the bid before it was opened at 1 p.m.

The only bid was from Mid-Continental Restoration Company, Fort Scott. It was for \$133,900 which was \$35,920 over the total project budget of \$97,980.

The commissioners agreed that the project would need to be bid again. Mr. Johnson said he would contact the State Historical Society on how to proceed with the project.
