And if you asked her about being a board member for so many years she would tell you that she just "fell" into the position when a member resigned and can't explain why she has never been replaced. When Ken Krien was mayor, he called her and asked her to serve on the board she didn't know what it involved but she was intrigued. As for the 20-plus years, Mrs. Johnson says, "How time flies when you're busy.'

About the retirement party, Donna just waves her hand and says, "Enough about me, let me tell you the <u>real</u> story." And the real story is about the Bird City Housing Authority board members and how they have provided affordable housing and how the housing project has been an asset to the community.

The original board members; E.W. Underwood, H.D. Shull, J.C. Gleason, Edgar Robertson, Ralph Leach and L. Hines, had their first meeting July 1, 1965 and in 1969, Bird City had the third government funding housing project built in the state of Kansas. They knew from the beginning that the project would have a positive impact in the community. During those 4 years of putting it all together, they stood up against negative criticism but continued to forge ahead to build. And what was once an empty lot, and later a tennis court, now is community housing for persons with all types of needs.

One negative aspect Mrs. Johnson has come across during her time on the board is the notion that
