Angie Berens, County Execu- for permanent residence or who County Farm Service Agency, is reminding foreign investors who Nationality Act; buy, sell or hold a direct or indirect interest in agricultural lands the laws of a foreign government in the United States that they are or which has located its principal application deadline for Citizen- Foreign Investment Disclosure United States; Act to report their holdings and transactions to the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture.

The Secretary of Agriculture has delegated the responsibility for collecting this information to the Farm Service Agency.

According to Mrs. Berens, foreign investors buying or selling land must report such transaction within 90 days of the date of the

Failure to file an accurate or timely report can result in a penalty with fines up to 25 percent of the fair market value of the agricultural land.

Mrs. Berens said the act requires reports to be filed by:

• individuals who are not U.S. citizens or citizens of the Northern Mariana Islands or the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands;

 individuals who are not lawfully admitted to the United States
