Public interest meeting held to answer residents' questions

On Tuesday, Cathy Domsch, executive director of Bird City Century II Development Foundation, held a "Public Interest Meeting for Housing in Bird City. On hand to answer questions was Northwest Kansas Housing, Inc. (NWKH) director, Loyce Schamberg. In addition, council members Wade Carmichael, Deb Smith and Mayor Troy Burr were present.

Moderate Income Housing Project

The meeting was to bring information to the community of Bird City about the Moderate Income Housing Project the City Council is promoting. Also, Century II is researching to see if the community is interested in an Assisted Living building project. The meeting outlined the facts, the description and the income scale of the housing project. The information given by power point expanded on what was already known by those of the community who attended. It was a meeting mostly of questions and

One question was centered on the \$25,000 that NWKH was requiring Bird City to invest. Chuck Kribs asked, "What is the source of the \$25,000?" Cathy said the Bird City Council had applied and received a grant from Century II for the \$25,000. Director Schamberg continued by saying that in the past, communities who invest and secured property to build have more success that those communities that NWKH just went in and built the homes. Community involvement was the key. Mayor Troy Burr added that building public utilities such as sewers and lights would be

a "security deposit." The project would call for two single-family units and two duplex units, making six units. The singlefamily units will be a rent-to-own contract, which at the end of 15 years; the tenant would have some cash equity built up in the house and be able to take advantage of no interest loan and state grants. The duplexes are not rent to own and must stay in the passion of NWKH for 30 years.

The one disadvantage brought up by Dir. Schamberg was that whoever was in the house at the end of 15 years would be eligible for the benefits. This means if after 14 years 11 months the tenant moves out, he or she will lose all the benefits and when the new tenant moves in, he or she will reap the benefits at 15 years.

One of the advantages is the income limit scale; the income would be assessed at the time of application. The rent will not change if the tenant's income increases. A good question was asked by Larry Henry about property taxes. Mr. Henry asked, "Will our property taxes go up?" Dir. Schamberger answered, "We do not have complete information about that, but if property taxes go up, this means your property value has gone up also." Mayor Burr added that the housing would increase the city's tax base simply because tenants would be paying more taxes with a house than having the lot vacant.

She went on to say that in the communities where they have put up these homes, the NWKH is

responsible for the maintaining of building. the properties.

Where they have built has been typically on unkempt land and when they were finished, the community was pleased with the results. NWKH is responsible for all the maintenance and repairs for the

Before tenants move in, they will be counseled on the requirements on the up keep of their homes and the yard. Dir. Schamberger made an important point by saying that Moderate Income Housing can be a great incentive to young families by making housing affordable. But, she stressed that the housing must have 100 percent occupancy to work. Research teams are investigating the potential for Bird City to have this occupancy.

Once everything has been passed and building starts, it will take 8 to 10 months to complete the building.


