in the top coyote calling contest in the nation. Billed as the Masters of Coyote Calling, St. Francis has been home for this event for the last 11 years. Some of the top coyote callers from 13 states around the Midwest have entered for the Jan. 5 and 6 dates.

Friday night over 300 people will be crammed into the 4-H building at the Cheyenne County Fairgrounds. Once the teams have had a good meal and are given the rules and regulation of the event, they will be turned loose to travel to where they will begin the hunt on Saturday morning.

After a hard hunt, the teams will again converge on St. Francis to bring back their harvested animals. Teams will hunt in three different states, Colorado, Kansas and Nebraska.
