
"The beautiful tree reflects the love and support for the Village's service to the residents, their families and the community," said Carol Redding, village resource development and coordinator.

The funds raised this year will go toward replacing the floor covering in the activity room.


People are urged to stop by the Village and see the new floor which will be installed in the near future. While there, stop by and visit the residents. They enjoy visiting with friends and neighbors.



Families to get help with their energy bills

Priority Oil and Gas LLC announced the company will once again be helping some families in Cheyenne County to meet their winter heating costs.

President/owner Robbie Gries said she realized that, with the rising energy costs, there are people who are having trouble paying their heating bills. She decided to begin the Cheyenne County Energy Assistance Program in the winter of 2005. Every year since then, Priority has continued to assist Cheyenne County residents with their escalating heating bills.

"The program is a direct relationship between the oil and gas company and low income families who need help with their heating bills because of the increase in energy prices," Ms. Gries said.

The program is comparable to the Low-Income Energy Assistance Program (LEAP).

Applications are available at the sheriff's or the county treasurer's offices, both located in the courthouse in St. Francis. People may call the company at 303-296-3435; e-mail priorityog@aol.com or contact Jessica Andrews in Idalia at 970-354-7495 for applications. Applications are due in Priority's office no later than Jan. 31.

"Helping residents with their heating bills is a way the company can give back to the community,' Ms. Gries said. "The assistance is not designed to pay the whole bill but assistance will be given on the varied bases of need. We try to weigh the need with the amount of dollars to be dispersed.' Priority owns wells only in Chey-

enne County, however, they have exploration projects in Wyoming and Colorado.

Ms. Gries started the company in 1992 and reformed the business in 1995. She started with 12 wells and is now up to 121 wells in the
