If anyone is eligible to join, members would welcome them to join and work to support the troops and the veterans who are serving and have served to keep the freedoms Kansas and must meet the basic CRP eligibility requirements. Acceptable land is cropland that was planted or considered planted to an agricultural commodity in four out of six years between 1996 and 2001 and which is also physically and legally capable of being planted in a normal manner to an agricultural commodity. Dryland corners of center-pivot irrigation systems may also be eligible.

Rental rates are based on three predominate soils. The agency bases rental rates on the average value of dry-land cash rent for the cent of a field for fields 25 acres or greater, with a maximum acreage of 80 acres per field. Fields less than 5 acres may be enrolled in their entirety.

Mid-contract management requirements will apply to CP38E enrollments. Signup for this runs continuously until the acreage goal of 30,100 is met.
