# Tips to help prevent dog bites

"Don't worry, my dog won't or handling, or are left tied up for bite." What mail carrier has not heard that more than once, but the fact is that last year alone more than 3,000 postal employees were attacked and/or bitten by dogs that broke loose from their owner's grip.

A dog's instinct is to protect the family and while postal carriers that deliver in the rural areas stay in their cars; there are still threats from dogs biting.

The Postal Service is declaring May 18 through 24, National Dog Bite Prevention Week and giving instructions on how to be a responsible dog owner.

Do not let your child take mail from the carrier in the presence of your dog; the dog may see it as a threat. Neutered and spayed dogs are less likely to bite. In addition, dogs that have not been properly socialized, receive little attention long periods frequently turn into biters.

Good instructions for everyone include: Wait to see if the dog looks friendly. Ask the owner permission to pet the dog. Invite the dog to come and sniff hands with fingers curled in.
