Council raises spending limit in the general fund

The Bird City Council July meeting was moved up a week to July 1 due to the upcoming harvest.

Waste Water Lagoon

Don High, Miller and Associates, presented the council with the invoice for \$44,333 for work done in June. The council agreed to pay \$24,833 from the revolving loan account and \$19,500 from the Community Block Development

Recently, city employees have been looking over AFLAC insurance to see if it was something they were interested in. Mr. Magnani asked if an employee could apply what is left over from the health cap to AFLAC, or if basic health insurance was \$150 per month could \$350 go towards an AFLAC policy?
