Fair board adds work nights to prepare for fair

At the July meeting, the last scheduled fair board meeting prior to the fair, the topic of the evening was mainly finalizing the fair plans. There are several things that need to be completed prior to the fair and the board members agreed to meet every Tuesday and Thursday evenings to work on the fairgrounds.

Board member, Rvan McAtee, volunteered to finish the new fencing on the west side of the grounds. President, Dick Bursch, told him that the new posts are already in, as is one line of wire. However, the remaining lines need to be put up and the old fence needs to be taken down.

Mr. Bursch noted that the old siding on the new building needs to be taken off. Jared Douthit, board member, told the board that he didn't think it would be feasible to complete the building prior to the 2008 fair. He said that the board may not be prepared for the additional costs associated with the repair of the wash rack line that backs up every year.

Mr. Bursch said he had Ron Krien help dig up part of the line to see if they would be able to determine what causes the wash rack line to back up. They found a repair that Mr. Krien had done several years prior. They repaired a larger patch in the same area that had filled up

Bursch called in a company from Goodland to use a camera to follow the line to help make sure they knew for sure what the root cause was and discovered the city line was also backed-up with dirt and sand. Although St. Francis city manager, J.R. Landenberger, said he would pay for the city line repair, there was some dispute among the board members about the price quoted for repairs by Mr. Krien, that the board would be responsible for. Despite the controversy, the board agreed that they needed to do what was necessary to their line too, to prevent any future problems. It was also decided that placing a grate over the drain might help keep the dirt and sand from washing and blowing into it during the months when it is not used.

Board member, Megan Douthit-Downey, reported that she still needed to find gate help, noting that Saturday evening for the derby would be the most important. The gate admissions have been set: Saturday's performance will be different from Wednesday, Thursday and Friday which will all be the same. They will also be the same as last year's prices.

Board member, Nick Ketzner, recommended that the 4-H members display the flag and recite the 4-H pledge in the arena prior to shows.

In other business In other business:

•Boardmember,ErikaZimbelman, reported that the vendor rules are now available and even though they already have some vendors that have reserved booths, there is still room for additional vendors.

Mr. Bursch recommended revising the policy on renting the facilities. The last time it was rented out, he said, he donated an hour of his time to clean and board treasurer, Lacy Reed and her children, donated another two hours to clean the facilities. It was decided that the rental deposit of \$150 would remain the same, however, if board members were required to clean, the renters would forfeit their entire deposit.

• Mr. Bursch informed the board that someone had approached him wanting to purchase the old electric poles that were removed. There's approximately 18 of various sizes and condition. The board decided to give Mr. Bursch authority to negotiate a price with the interested party

• Extension agent, Joe Leibbrandt, notified the board that he thought several sorting boards were gone or missing. He was unable to find them at the last livestock show.

He asked the board if they would allow Francis O'Leary, 4-H shooting sports leader, to paint stripes on the floor for the shooting sports competition at fair. They normally use chalk but constantly have to redo the lines and thought paint might help simplify things. The board agreed as long as they were kept even and neat.

• Mr. Leibbrandt said that if straw was needed, he has someone who can help supply straw for the beef tie-outs.

Mr. Bursch said that the new deed for the traded land would have to wait to be completed until a new county attorney was appointed.

• The board would like to "toss" fair T-shirts to the crowd during the parade and the Friday and Saturday evening performances. It was decided that they would have 50 shirts made to give out.


