She also helps Christian missionaries and Jewish immigrants who are struggling financially, distributing humanitarian aid such as clothing, food, medicine, school supplies and money for emergencies, electricity and other needs to the poor. Her work takes her into the highways and byways, fields and villages of Israel.
