Tenille Lee, director of nursing. had a presentation on the cardiac monitors. She said the current equipment is obsolete and the only replacement/repair parts the staff can get are refurbished.

The nursing staff has reported interference with the wireless system that is now found in some areas. Mrs. Lee said the new equipment would operate off a designated frequency so the staff would no longer have the interference.

WHEREAS:

The Board of Education of Unified School District No. 103, Cheyenne/Rawlins County, State of Kansas, is authorized by K.S.A. 72-8801 as amended by 1988 HB 2882, to make an annual tax levy for a period of time not exceeding three years in an amount not to exceed six mills upon the assessed tangible taxable property in the district for the purpose specified in said law; and

WHEREAS:

Board of Education has determined to exercise the authority vested in it by said

NOW THEREFORE:

Be It Resolved that:

The above-named school board shall be authorized to make an annual tax levy for a period not to exceed three years in an amount not to exceed six mills upon the assessed taxable tangible property

in such school district for the purpose of acquisition, construction, reconstruction, repair, remodeling, additions to, furnishing and equipping of buildings necessary for school district purposes, including housing and boarding pupils enrolled in an area vocational school operated under the board, architectural expenses incidental thereto, the acquisition of building sites, the undertaking and maintenance of asbestos control projects, the acquisition of school buses and the acquisition of other equipment and for the purpose of paying a portion of the principal and interest on bonds issued by cities under the authority of K.S.A. 12-1774, and amendments thereto, for the financing of redevelopment projects upon property located within the school district. The tax levy authorized by this resolution may be made, unless petition in opposition to the same, signed by not less than 10% of the qualified electors of the school district within 40 days after the last publication of this resolution. In the event a petition is filed the county election officer shall submit the question of whether the tax levy shall be authorized to the electors in the school district at an election called for the purpose or at the next general election, as is specified by
