Airport runway will be renovated

karen.k@nwkansas.com The Airport Authority had good news for the Cheyenne County Commissioners when they met on Friday.

Dave Yost and Ron Louden, Authority members, had brought Diane Hofer, who is with Olsons Associates, Lincoln, Neb. Ms. Hofer said the Federal Aviation Administration has changed the plans for the airport runway renovation. The runway will be completely redone, widening it to 75-feet and it will be constructed of concrete, not asphalt. New runway lights will also be put in at the same time

In the future, the runway will be extended to the south. Right now, there is not sufficient money.

Milling up the old asphalt runway and running the concrete for the new one will cost approximately \$1.9 million. The county's share of the cost is 5 percent.

The project will be bid in 2009. Ms. Hofer said congress is slow in giving out the money and the Aviation Administration doesn't have the authorization to write the grants. She figured it would probably be July or August before the bids were let and when the grants were distributed. He said the Aviation Administration doesn't want to drop a project in the middle so they will support the runway project until it is done. This is, he said, a good time to bid because it is possible the bid will come in under budget.

We appreciate the commissioners' support of the project so we can keep it going," Mr. Yost said. "The work has already improved the airport.'

It is amazing, said Terry Miller, clerk, that we can give someone 100,000 and they will give us 2million.

During construction, the airport will be closed. The Authority members and commissioners were concerned about the medical flight plane which uses the airport. When a more definite date is known, the Authority will let the hospital administrator know what the plans are so arrangements can be made.

The Authority members were pleased that the runway would be made of concrete as it would last for years and, unlike the asphalt, there will not be the constant patching. Ms. Hofer said the high costs of oil had caused
