County law agreement okayed

karen.k@nwkansas.com The County Cheyenne Commissioners signed the county agreement with Bird City for law enforcement when they met on Friday.

Sheriff Craig Van Allen had the updated contract for the county agreement with Bird City. The county provides law coverage for Bird City and the city pays \$30,000. With the new contract, they have agreed to pay \$31,500, a 5-percent increase.

Two of the officers live in Bird City and there is more coverage during school hours.

Sheriff Van Allen said he will be attending a mandatory training for sheriffs. Andy Beikman, commissioner, asked if he had enough people to cover for him while he is gone. The sheriff said he did.

The commissioners had received a contract which requested that the county pay 75-percent of the utility costs. Mr. Beikman said the emergency medical service director provided the facts that, as of Nov. 1, of the 250 runs, 164 were St. Francis runs.
