
## **Obituaries**

March 31, 1930 - Jan. 8, 2009 Maurice "Moe" William Riley, 78, of Iola, Kan., died Thursday, Jan. 8, 2009, at his home.

He was born March 31, 1930, at Piqua to William J. and Frances (Nieman) Riley. He received his elementary schooling in Piqua, attended Rockhurst High School in Kansas City and then transferred and graduated from Maur Hill High School in Atchison in 1948. He received his bachelor of science degree in 1952 from St. Benedicts College (now Benedictine College).

Moe served in the U.S. Army during the Korean War, in the Intelligence Corp. as a photo interpreter. He served with the Army, Marines, Navy and Air Force. # Jan. 31 deadline for assistance application

Priority Oil and Gas will once again be helping some families in Cheyenne County to meet their winter heating costs. Applications are due by Jan. 31.

Priority president and owner Robbie Gries said she realized that, with the rising energy costs, there are people who are having trouble paying their heating bills and decided to begin the Cheyenne County Energy Assistance Program in the winter of 2005. Every year since then, Priority has continued to assist Cheyenne County residents with their escalating heating bills.

"The program is a direct relationship between the oil and gas company and low income families who need help with their heating bills because of the increase in energy prices," Ms. Gries said.

The program is comparable to the Low-income Energy Assistance Program (LEAP).

Applications are available at various locations in St. Francis and Bird City. Applications are due in Priority's office no later than Jan. 31.

"Helping residents with their heating bills is a way the company can give back to the community," Ms. Gries said. "The assistance is not designed to pay the whole bill but assistance will be given on the varied bases of need. We try to weigh the need with the amount of dollars to be dispersed.'

Priority Oil and Gas LLC owns natural gas wells only in Cheyenne County, however, they have exploration projects in Wyoming and County Energy Assistance Pro-Colorado.
