

The courthouse steps were closed in December 2007 after the insurance company refused to cover the county. The steps are uneven and considered a liability.

The bids for the steps would include having the present steps removed and the dirt, which was placed underneath when the new steps were built, removed. Then floating pavers would be installed. There was a possibility that the concrete at the end of the steps would need to be removed and replaced.

The courthouse is on the Kansas Historical Register. All the remodeling and renovation needs to be approved by the Kansas organization before it is done.
