President Dave Yost gave a tion. He said that sufficient county funds were available for the matching funds required for the upcoming runway widening project. The best estimate for the cost of widening and installation of new runway lights is \$1.956 million dollars, and the local match will total \$97,800 (5 percent). It was noted that federal matching funds are raised from aviation fuel taxes and taxes on airline tickets, not local tax dollars.

The project will be bid on May 1 and construction could begin as soon as Aug. 17.


