



karen.k@nwkansas.com A great deal of discussion was held when the sheriff told the county commissioners, at their Friday meeting, about the need for a new vehicle. The end result was the commissioners agreed to purchase the vehicle from the federal government General Service Administration program.

Sheriff Craig Van Allen had prices for three Ford Expeditions: Yost Ford-Mercury, St. Francis, \$28,366; Brenner Ford, Goodland, \$25,687; and from a federal government program, \$23,872. The federal government program buys vehicles in bulk and can offer vehicles at a lesser price to law departments involved in drug control.

After the vehicle is shipped directly to the county at a cost of \$150, it will need to be "prepped" by a dealer. Sheriff Van Allen had bids from Yost, \$1,500 and from Brenner, \$550.

It will be between 90 and 120 days before the new vehicle arrives. The sheriff said it would cost approximately \$1,500 for lights and controls; decals will cost around \$400. The cage used for protection of the officer driving, located between the front and back seat, will be one that can be removed.
