## Emergency medical technicians in short supply, especially in Bird City

especially in the Bird City area.

County Emergency Medical Service director, reported at the Friday county commissioners' meeting that there might be a slightly longer dispatch time for both Bird City and St. Francis ambulance calls.

"We are approaching the time of year that the majority of the technicians in Bird City and St. Francis are usually out on agriculturalrelated jobs that do not allow them to respond in a timely manner,"

The Kansas State Board of Emergency Medical Services arrival of the ambulance.

Emergency medical technicians dictates a minimum requirement are needed in Cheyenne County, of technicians on a call calendar. Medical Service is providing pa-At lest two emergency medical Jannelle Bowers, Cheyenne service personnel, specifically at least one first responder or higher and one emergency medical technician-B or higher must be available in order for an ambulance to proceed to the scene.

"We are asking the citizens of our county for their help in understanding this matter due to the possibility of an ambulance coming from another town," Mrs. Bowers said. "There might be a delay in transportation."

Typically, one or more technicians will respond to the scene to provide patient care prior to the

tient care to the best of our ability," Mrs. Bowers said.

The service personnel is asking for understanding and cooperation from local employers. The state prohibits employers from discharging any employee by reason of the fact that the employee performs duties as a volunteer fire fighter, volunteer certified emergency medical services attendant, as defined in KSA 65-6112. Also amended are volunteer reserve law enforcement officers or part-

time law enforcement officers. "We are deeply grateful to all employers who not only allow their employees to leave work to

## Construction of steps near completetion

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Finally! After several years of discussing, bidding and, in short, going to the west side of the courthouse to enter, the public will be able to use the courthouse steps by July 1.

The Cheyenne County Commissioners discussed the steps at the Friday meeting and called the low bidder, Cary Stupka, Concordia, to meet them Monday afternoon.

Mr. Stupka traveled from Norton where he was completing a job on the prison. He talked about his plans for the replacement of the steps. He is the general contractor and has hired Kansas Concrete, Salina, to take out the cement, noting that the center will be taken out in bigger pieces and the cement near the step side wall will carefully be taken out in smaller pieces so as not to damage the brickwork.

Mid-Continental Restoration, Concordia, will be putting in the stone steps. Mr. Stupka said the stones will be cut to size before arriving in St. Francis. There was a question about the middle handrail as it wasn't included in the drawings. Mr. Stupka said he didn't think that would be a problem and Eric Johnson, engineer, will probably put that into the drawings.

He said he will plan to move his equipment from Norton to St. Francis so it will be ready when the construction begins. The dirt will then be removed At the time of construction, a \$78,384 from the Kansas State

equipment trailer.

The courthouse doors will need some work and there is a \$2,200 (not \$22,000 as stated in a previous story) alternate bid which will take care of that expense.

As plans stand, barring a great ready for use at the end of June or first of July.

**Funding** Funding the steps project has been a concern for commissioners as well as the courthouse staff and patrons. In December 2007, the steps were closed on orders of the county's insurance company as

they were determined "unsafe." Greg Kite, former resident now serving on the Sedwick Historical Society, heard about the steps and said that there were grants available for replacing the steps back

to their original state. The county received a grant for

cover the remainder of the costs. Unfortunately, there were no bids on the project and winter was closing in. The grant was renewed and the bids were sent out shortly after the first of the year.

Mr. Stupka's bid was the low bid deal of rain, the steps should be at \$135,900 which was \$139,061 lower than the other bid received from Shamber Historic Preservation, Damar.

However, the county was still short of funds. Mr. Kite said he thought he could get another \$11,700 grant and possibly some other funding. When all the figures were totaled, the county will be able to meet the cost of the steps.

The commissioners, while anxious to get the project rolling, are cautious about getting the work done to meet specifications of the Kansas Historical Society and the insurance company.
