The Kansas Department of Health and Environment's Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices has come out with the new school year immunization requirements and recommendations. The regulations define immunizations required for any individual who attends school or early childhood programs operated by a school.

• Diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis (DPaT): five doses required. Four doses acceptable if dose 4 given on or after the fourth birthday. Booster dose of Tdap is required at age 11. Students who will be 12 years of age on Sept. 1, 2009, should have documentation of Tdap if more than 2 years since previous dose of Td.

• Poliomyelitis (IPV/OPV): four doses required. Three doses acceptable if dose 3 given on or after the

fourth birthday. • Measles, Mumps, Rubella

(MMR): two doses required. • Hepatitis B: three doses required

through grade nine. • Varicella (chickenpox): two

nine unless history of varicella disease documented by a licensed physician. Two doses are currently recommended for all ages.

• Haemophilus Influenza type b (HIB) three doses required for children less than 5 years of age in early childhood programs. Total doses needed dependent on the age of the

• Pneumococcal Conjugate (PCV7): than 5 years of age in early childhood programs. Total doses needed dependent on the age of the child

• Hepatitis A; two doses required for children less than 5 years of age

• Meningococcal (MCV4): one dose recommended for greater than 11 years of age; this vaccine is not required for school entry. For seniors going off to college, some colleges and universities are requiring this vaccine especially if you will doses required for kindergarten; one be living in a dormitory on campus.

• Human Papillomavirus (HPV): three doses recommended for females greater than 11 years of age; this vaccine in not required for school entry but highly encouraged.

• Influenza: yearly vaccination recommended for all ages greater than 6 months of age; this vaccine is not required for school entry.

Kansas' childhood immunization rates have been increasing and those improvements have earned the state the recognition of having the second highest increase in immunization rates over the past three years. This gives Kansas kids a healthier start in life and promotes preventative care in Kansas




