## **Board discusses fair plans**

When the Cheyenne County Fair Board was called to order at the April meeting, quorum was not met; however, Joe Leibbrandt, extension agent, presented an update on 4-H information concerning the May 23 Spring Livestock Show while they waited for one more member to arrive.

Mr.. Leibbrandt told members the animals for the show would be arriving around the third week of May. In addition, hiring for judges will be just before the show.

He reported a steer that belongs to one of the 4-H participants had died and would the board agree to a replacement. Discussion followed with members wondering if there was still time enough for the steer to be eligible for state competition. Mr. Leibbrandt said that if the steer was registered by May 1, a decent amount of management time was available to participate in the county fair.

"The kids should be given every break to participate," said Dick Bursch, president. Board members agreed the steer should be replaced.

Lower number for quorum

Mr. Bursch asked the attending members that they might want consider lowering the present to quorum. The reason being with 13 members and the quorum being six and one-half, it has been difficult to get seven members to attend a meeting.

He added, for the last three years, the commissioners approved four members present to pay bills. He suggested that the quorum be lowered to six members because in recent months, one member has attended one time, four members twice and one member never and it is a problem.

Shortly, Karol Lohman arrived and the quorum was met. Motion carried to lower quorum to six members.

#### New gazebo on fair grounds

Bill Ehrman, representing the Amusement Authority, said that when the weather warms up, workers would like to pour the cement pad for the rest area he had proposed at the last meeting.

At the last meeting, there was discussion concerning obstructing the driveway emergency vehicles use. John Finley, board member, and Mr. Ehrman concluded that the only vehicle that would be of concern would be the 32-foot ladder truck; however, if there is no roof that

#### Fair events

#### Fairgrounds

Mr. Bursch reported there are 39 tables and 150 chairs to use during fair time. He said that about 20 tables and an unknown amount of chairs are missing from the fairgrounds.

> Mr. Bursch told the members he had inspected the doors during March and found that after the Wildlife Banquet, the doors were closed; however, on the day of the meeting, he found the doors open and the furnace on.

> Mr. Bursch continued by reporting the doors on the east side of the exhibit building are installed, insulated and working good. He added Ron Krien would have the gutters fixed as soon as weather permitted.

Mrs. Lohman reported that several renters have not yet paid for the use of the exhibit building. She wanted to have it clarified that deposits and rents were due before the renters could use the building.

Mr. Bursch read a "thank you" letter from Angie Berens for the use of the exhibit building during a event.
